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Blackboard Discussion Board Quick Guide

On the course menu, select Tools and then Discussion Board. The main Discussion Board page appears with a list of available discussion forums. On this page, you can perform these actions: Select a forum title to view the messages. Forum titles in bold contain unread posts. Select a forum to open the thread of posts. Select the number in the Unread Posts column for quick access to a forum's unread messages.

The main discussion board page displays a list of forums. A forum is where participants discuss a topic or a group of related topics. Within each forum, users can create multiple threads.

For smaller course groups, you can also offer group discussions where only members of the group may access the discussion. When you convert your course from the Original Course View to the Ultra Course View, some discussions are flattened and some settings are removed. Learn more about the conversion process.

On your course's Control Panel, expand the Course Tools section and select Discussion Board. On the Discussion Board page, the course discussion board and all group discussion boards appear. Select a group discussion board. On the next Discussion Board page, select Edit in the forum's menu.

Group Discussions | Blackboard Help

Use the check boxes to select one or more thread and perform actions such as Collect or Mark as Read. Select a thread title to read the posts. Bold titles contain unread posts. View a forum's threads in a list view or in a tree view, with all posts listed after each thread title. More on forums and threads with JAWS.

One recommendation for arranging the discussion board in your class is to create a separate forum for each topic or unit covered in the course. Accessing the Discussion Board Log into your Blackboard course and click on the Discussion Board link in the course menu.

Creating a Discussion Board Forum | Blackboard Learn ...

Go to the "Edit Forum" page: If you're creating the forum, first add its title and description, then click Next. If you have already created the forum. Click on the Discussions link in the course menu (or the "Discussion Board" link under Course Tools) to pull up the list of discussion board forums in your course.

With adaptive release, instructors can create a set of rules to control how content is released to students in their courses. The rules may be related to availability, date and time, individual usernames, membership in course groups, review status of another item in the course, and Grade Center items such as scores, attempts, and calculated columns.

Discussion Boards in Blackboard. The Discussion Board is a communication tool that may be used in your Blackboard class. An instructor adds a forum and conversations are grouped in discussion threads. Posts can be saved, viewed by the rest of the class, and may even be graded by your instructor. Click Discussion Board on the left side of the screen.

Address your classmates by their names when responding to their posts. Don't dominate the conversation. Ask questions and point out specific details that you found interesting about the other posts. Keep in mind that your goal in responding is rooted in keeping the conversation going.

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
